


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# HOW TO USE THIS WORKBOOK?



## WHAT IS THE GOAL OF THIS WORKBOOK?

## **Does this seem familiar?**



Timothy observes the condition of the church and asks himself: "What should I do?"

What are the characteristics of a church that's in a good condition? And what should be done if it doesn't correspond to reality?

This is the main theme of the letter Paul is writing to Timothy. You will find this out too with the help of this workbook.

But first, read the letter for yourself and take a look at the corresponding videos. This will provide you with a great overview.

## INTRODUCTION

It always moves spectators to see a father cheers on his son in a competition.

1 Timothy is precisely this. A spiritual father, Paul, encouraging his son, Timothy<sup>1</sup>, to run the race for the kingdom of God even though times are difficult.

Timothy came to Christ when he was a young child. His mother was a Jewish believer, but his father was Greek.

During his second missionary trip, Paul met Timothy in Lystra and they clicked<sup>2</sup>. Although they were complete opposites in character<sup>3</sup>, Timothy became Paul's main travel companion.

But sometimes they needed to work on different fronts, and then Paul would communicate with Timothy through letters.

## The House of God

1 Timothy was written to Timothy, while he was working in Ephesus<sup>4</sup>. Ephesus...Ephesians...Yes exactly. It's the same city as Ephesians was addressed to. That's why they also have things in common. Namely, that both letters speak about the house of God.

Ephesians shows us the counsel of God...like the big picture; And Timothy shows us how to actually work it out locally. If you want to add Corinthians into the mix, you could say that while 1 Corinthians shows the internal order, ...or maybe disorder would be more appropriate, 1 Timothy shows the external order: How to behave in the house of God.

### The house of God

God always had a desire to live among his people. In the times of the Old Testament, God dwelled in the tabernacle and later in the temple in Jerusalem. But these are just a picture of the things he would do with the believers of our time. We find this in the New Testament:

## THE HOUSE OF GOD

## **Ephesians**

Here we see **God's counsel**. The things he had planned before the creation of the world *(Eph. 1:4)*. This letter answers, among other things, the following question: Who lives in this house? How was this house established? Who are the

ones that think of this? (Eph. 2:22)

## **1** Timothy

This letter talks about the **structural organization**, that is the external order of the house of God. Which elements need to be implemented in order for a local church to be in a good condition? How should you behave in the house of God? (3:15)





## **1** Corinthians

In this letter you will find the **moral character** of the house of God. Or rather, of those who are the house of God(*1. Cor. 3:16).* So, the internal order.



## **CHAPTER 1**

## What does the law mean for us today?

From the moment you start to think that any kind of external restrictions will make God accept us is when you start to fall into lawfulness.

### Why?

Because that's when you start to fall into a system of "quid pro quo". When I do something, I will get something in return from God. Your life will be founded on merit instead of God's mercy.

### Attack against the Doctrine

Satan will attack the church using the Word of God, just like he did with the Lord in the wilderness. *(Mat. 4:1-10)*. And that's exactly what the Judaizers did by trying to lead the people back under the law and get them to hold on to earthly things (genealogy, family, the law). In the first chapter Paul reminds Timothy of the overall mission: He left him in Ephesus, because he was afraid that the Judaizers would come in and preach false doctrine to these new converts. He reminds him again what the purpose of the LAW was:

- To convict unbelievers<sup>1</sup> of sin and lead them to the savior.
- He urges Timothy to keep this in mind, using himself as an example.

So, a church needs good **DOCTRINE**.

## **CHAPTERS 2&3**



But knowledge without a prayer life is like salad without dressing. Dry and tasteless. So, Chapter 2 is all about the way **PRAYER** should be conducted in the church.

Furthermore, he addresses the right position of men and women in the church.

In Chapter 3 he speaks about two very important offices in



In every system that God established there is leadership: Creation, Family, Humans...and also the Church.

The Lord Jesus is the head of the Church, the great shepherd and therefore, he established overseers in the local church to watch out for the flock.

These positions are not voted upon, because authority in the Bible never comes from underneath, but from above. From the head.

a local church. Overseers and deacons.

However, this does not mean that there is no leadership. The Holy Spirit directs the believers and works in the hearts of some holy men to aspire to such a work.<sup>1</sup>

Now, the problem is: Even unholy men could step forward and say: "I want to act as an elder". That's why 1 Timothy 3 includes a **CHECKLIST** that would be impossible to live by without the Holy Spirit.

So, if someone engages in the work of an elder and shows the qualities described in this list, the others are called to recognize such men. They have a great responsibility as they will have to give account for the souls of their congregation before the Lord, the head of the Church himself.<sup>2</sup>

Doctrine, prayer and leadership. These are the 3 fundamental pillars of a local church. And how Timothy himself is to behave, we will see in the next chapters.



### Prayer

God wants us to pray:

1. With holy hands This means that we separate ourselves from evil.

2. Without anger Without unresolved issued among brothers and sisters in faith

**3. Without quarreling** By letting the Spirit work, without speaking empty words that have no life, for instance *(Mat. 6:7)*.

1"If anyone aspires to the office of overseer, he desires a noble task" 3:1

### Checklist

This list can be supplemented with what Paul is writing in his letter to Titus *(Titus 1:6-9)*

## CHAPTER 4 - A GOOD TEACHER

We saw the 3 fundamental pillars of a local church:

- 1. Doctrine
- 2. Prayer
- 3. Leadership

But what happens when things get messed up? When your local church is a mess?

How should I personally live things out?

In theory, everything seems to be going well, but Paul knows that in later days some will depart from the faith, because they will listen to deceiving spirits and doctrines of demons<sup>1</sup>.

Now we might think: "Whoa, doctrine about demons and Satan... in the church?" Well...it's not as freakish as you think: They will tell you not to get married and they will tell you not to eat this or that food.

That sounds FAMILIAR, doesn't it?

So, Paul tells Timothy how to be a good teacher (Chapter 4) and how to be a good counsellor (Chapter 5-6).

If you want to be **a good teacher**, you need to focus on **2** things:

### Knowing your Bible

"Knowing your Bible" includes:

- Knowing the great biblical themes that appear throughout the entire bible (God, sin, salvation, etc.). You need to have an overview.
- 2. Diligently studying the Christian doctrine (4:6). This means to expect important details in each verse in order to withstand wrong teachings.

## Keep your life in check

Knowledge without practice disqualifies a teacher.

Timothy was supposed to:

- 1. Set the believers an example in speech, in conduct, in love, in faith, in purity *(4:12)*.
- 2. Make progress that all should see (4:15)

The Lord also spoke about acting first and then teaching *(Mat. 5:19)*.

1"the Spirit expressly says that in later times some will depart from the faith by devoting themselves to deceitful spirits and **teachings** of demons"4:1-2

### Familiar

Paul mentions two points that are not necessarily unbiblical:

- 1. Being single
- 2. Fasting

This shows, like we already saw on page 6, that Satan does not necessarily approach with a direct attack. Instead, he will deceitfully take a thought, one you can find in the Word, blow it out of proportion and make a law out of it. If it's being taught that you have to do these things in order to become spiritual, then it's against the Word.

That's the movement (Gnosticism) that led the priests in the catholic church to celibacy.

Details matter in the last days. Not just a quick bible reading and then it's all about organising the next pajama party. That's exactly how Timothy would ruin a church and make young people leave as soon as the lights go out in Christian Disneyland.

Timothy shouldn't care about silly **PSEUDO-CHRISTIAN** stuff and extra-biblical stories.

Instead of doing **CROSSFIT** for the whole day, he should train himself in Godliness. To love God instead of lust, greed and self-worship.

### **Christian fables:**

This type of literature is especially dangerous, because it conveys a false image of God, a false view of what we truly are in Christ.

### **Physical Exercise**

Timothy was a Greek, and young Greeks (age 16-18) played a lot of sports. Their performances were very admirable. The context back then seems to be very similar to our situation today.

### Don't forget:

- Physical exercise is useful! Your body needs to be able to be an instrument for the service of God.
- 2. Godliness is useful for everything.

### The Fear of the Lord

Two thoughts abouts the fear of the Lord:

"The fear of the Lord is the beginning of knowledge." (Pro. 1:7)

"The fear of the Lord is hatred of evil."

(Pro. 8:13)

If you want to understand the Word of God, then you need to separate yourself from evil; and if you want to separate yourself from evil, fear the Lord. In order for you to understand these basic topics better, take a look at our Fear of the Lord series!

He should also avoid being too childish in his behavior or reasoning so that people would not have reason to reject him because of his youth<sup>1</sup>.

### So, he should:

- 1. Have GOD-FEARING behavior
- 2. Place the Word front and center.

...because in doing this, Timothy will save both himself and those who hear him.

## CHAPTERS 5 & 6 A GOOD COUNSELER

This would then be his foundation to have a clear view on pastoral questions relating to different groups that are in the church:

Older and younger folks

Widows (and there were a lot because a caring church is an excellent insurance system for old women who have no breadwinner)

Elders - they are the backbone of a local church and should receive **double honor**:

### Slander

The Greek word that sometimes gets translated as slander is "diabolos" (3:11; 2 Tim. 3:3; Tit. 2:3). It's the same term that's also used for "devil". It corresponds to the character of the devil, to slander and to accuse.

### Money

So that their financial situation does not cease the work in the Word (and they don't become entangled in worldly affairs)

### Protection

So that nobody **SLANDERS** them and ruins their reputation.

Chapters 6 addresses the professional world. Today we would call them "employees" instead of "slaves". Employees should respect their masters irrespective of whether they are Christians or not.

Paul then addresses the destructive force in a local church: MONEY.

He urges Timothy to personally stay away from the love of money and to keep the rich people in check so that they don't misuse it or put their trust in money. Money

3 remarks about money:

- Timothy was supposed to be careful not to get influenced by money. A preacher can easily slightly reduce the truth of the Word of God because a great donor is in the audience.
- Our life (Col. 3:1-3) and our treasure (Mat. 6:20) are in heaven. If we use our money exclusively for this earth, our life will go right past us (6:2+19). Don't forget that money can become an idol (Mat. 6:24) and that you can only serve one master.
- 3. Conclusion: "flee these things" (6:11)



**Good doctrine** is being preached. Study the bible for yourself and walk in the fear of the Lord.





**Leadership** is being carried out correctly. Make sure that the elders, the teachers have enough money to live, and do not criticize them.

Do you preserve the treasure that was given to you?

## ANNEXES

## **Answers to the questions**

### **Question P.6**

The law (Greek: nomos) is not the life principal of a Christian, and it never had a function other than to show us our sinful condition and to make it clear to us that we cannot reach God's standard. In **Matthew 5:21-48** Jesus explains to the Pharisees what the real standard of God is, and shows them that it's impossible to please God through the law. He ends with the statement: "You therefore must be perfect, as your heavenly Father is perfect." **Mat. 5:48** 

### **Question P.9**

Satan knows the Bible better than you. In **Luke 4:10** he quotes a passage to Jesus. But he quotes it a bit wrong (he applies a general promise to a specific case). It is always important to understand what a person is really trying to say. Create your own picture, meaning an overview of the bible (like Paul will advise Timothy in his 2nd letter) and study the details in the Bible.

### **Question P.11**

Words and behavior are mentioned in both passages. The Lord showed again and again that what comes out of our bodies shows what is in our hearts (Luke 6:45; Mat. 7:16-20).
